ATHLETIC FACILITIES AT THE MOUNT

The Mount provides its students with athletic fields and the Harrington Center, a modern two-level student union with a running track, gym, fitness center, and food court. During the 2003-2004 academic year, the Mount began its Campus Expansion Plan, which includes athletic fields to accommodate more Mount teams on campus for practice and home games.

The Mount's East Fields on Delhi Road, which have been the home field for women's soccer, have been expanded into a game field and running track with seating for up to 2,400 spectators. The new Sports Complex gives the Mount Lions' football team its first home field on campus since 1990. It also provides a home field for women's soccer, men's soccer and lacrosse teams for men (2007) and women (2008). The track serves the Mount's track & field teams and additional facilities house the Mount's academic program in athletic training, as well as locker rooms and concessions. The Campus Expansion Plan also included the renovation of nearby College property into practice fields. The Lions' softball team began playing home games at the new River Road softball field in 2007.

The Mount Lions' baseball team plays home games at Midland Field, one of Cincinnati's finest baseball facilities for teams and spectators.

The Harrington Center, which opened in 1998, contains two full courts for Lions volleyball and basketball as well as the full range of Mount intramural teams. The Harrington Center also features a specially surfaced indoor running track; courts for racquetball, squash and walleyball; fitness center; weight training; athletic training; and locker facilities.

The Mount's west campus field, the J. Page Hayden Athletic Field, is the location for the Mount's field events during track & field meets and is a practice field for the Lions' Roar Marching Band. The Mount also provides lighted tennis courts for intercollegiate and intramural teams.

The Mount men's golf team's home course is Miami Whitewater Forest Golf Course in Harrison, Ohio. The course is a par-72, 6,808-yards course with a rating of 72.3 and a slope of 125.

MOUNT ATHLETICS DIRECTOR



Steve Radcliffe

Steve Radcliffe enters his 13th year as the Lions' athletic director for the 2007-2008 school year, and he looks forward to another outstanding season of athletics at the Mount. The Lions captured three conference championships last fall. The football team won their third straight HCAC championship, and once again qualified to the NCAA Division III playoffs. The volleyball team was first in

the HCAC regular season and won their ninth straight HCAC Tournament title advancing them to the Great Lakes Regional. The baseball team won the HCAC Tournament title advancing to the Mideast Regional. The Mount also had men's lacrosse for the first time last spring.

In addition, there were plenty of other highlights, both individually and team-wise, for the Mount's athletic programs last season. The women's soccer team and men's basketball teams both had winning

season, as women's soccer advanced to the HCAC Tournament championship game. The Lions' wrestling team was second in the conference, fourth in the regional and sent two wrestlers to the NCAA Division III National Wrestling Tournament, recording two placers.

Radcliffe has long been a part of the sports programs at the Mount. A retired athletic trainer, Radcliffe began his athletic training career in 1976 and was hired to implement the Mount's first academic program for athletic training in 1989. In addition, Radcliffe has been the Lions' head athletic trainer, working with athletes from all the intercollegiate sports, as well as teaching athletic training at the College.

Radcliffe, who received his bachelor's degree in 1978 and his master's in physical education in 1981 from Miami University (Ohio), became the Mount's athletic director in 1995. Upon entering the position, Radcliffe stressed the importance of upholding the College's stellar reputation of academics and athletics as a positive influence in student life and development at the Mount.

Steve and his wife, Darlene, have two children, Victoria and Michael. The Radcliffes live in Delhi.

2007 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Lions made HCAC history in 2006, becoming the first school ever to capture three straight conference titles, recording a perfect 7-0 mark. The Mount posted a 9-2 overall mark, losing their final regular season game and falling to Wheaton College, 42-28, in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs. The NCAA appearance was the third consecutive for the Lions.

COACHING STAFF: The Lions will have a good mix of returning coaches from last season and new faces in charge of team personnel. Head Coach Rod Huber will be the team's defensive coordinator this fall, and will coach the inside linebackers. The biggest addition to the Mount's coaching staff this season will be former Anderson High School coach Vince Suriano. Suriano will be the Lions offensive coordinator. The assistant head coach will be in charge of the team's quarterbacks and in charge of the Mount's strength and conditioning program. Other new coaches this season include Dick Nocks (offensive line), Ben Osborne (center/guard), Brad Phillips (defensive line), Mike Corson (defensive line); as well as recent Mount players Todd Hogel (inside linebackers), B.J. Adams (secondary) and Brenton Eisenhard (offensive assistant). Nocks and Corson are long-time high school assistant coaches who enjoyed success on the prep level. Corson helped Princeton High School to three state championship titles. Mount returning assistant coaches are Ron Woyan (running backs/special teams), Jeff Hill (secondary), Ron Corradini (secondary), and Stu Shestina (receivers).

"I felt we needed a full-time coach to run the offense," says Huber of Suriano. "Vince is a brilliant coach and he is well respected. I feel very confident in what he'll bring our team. Coach Nocks is a very knowledgeable coach, and is a great technician. He worked with Vince and we're looking forward to what he'll do for us."

RECRUITING: Huber and his staff welcome nearly 60 new players to camp this season, bringing the team's numbers close to 120 for the beginning of fall training camp. The Lions' veteran coach expects many freshmen to get a good chance at playing time, mainly on special teams.

"We think we have recruited a very talented class," Huber adds. "We've always said that we're going to build the program around the Greater Cincinnati area but we want to grow regionally and nationally as well. We've gotten players from quite a few different states and have done well in the region, namely Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Michigan. We'll play a full JV schedule this season (seven games) and that will enable our players to get time on the field and learn our system."

SPRING FOOTBALL: Coach Huber, along with Suriano, were pleased with how the team did during the off-season spring workouts. With upwards of 13 spring workouts, the Lions saw a lot of work completed through a large group of players as Suriano worked through a lot of plays for the first time.

"We got a lot of things done during the spring and it will help us when we come back and tweak some things in the fall," Suriano says.

"We're really excited about spring ball and the things we accomplished," Huber states. "We added some new packages, on offense and defense. We're excited about how things are progressing over the summer and into the fall workouts."

OFFENSE: The Mount welcomes back a lot of experience on the offensive side of the ball this season, including all-time leading rusher Mike Lovell, a senior, senior wideout Mike Jones, who led the team with 23 catches and three TD receptions in 2006; and senior tight end Marcus Pryor. Lovell is a three-time All-HCAC First Team honoree, two-time HCAC MVP and two-time All-American. The Lions also return experience and talent on the offensive line in senior All-American Steve Wergers, sophomore Anthony Walsh and senior Brian White, among others.

Suriano plans to bring a good mix of rushing and passing out of various formations. The Mount may line-up in a spread formation at times and Suriano and Huber will be looking at a new quarterback to direct the Lions' attack this fall. Those who will compete for the number one signalcaller's job are sophomore Vince Palmer, junior John Barbour and freshman Chris Howland. Palmer and Howland are in their first years at the Mount, while Barbour is switching to quarterback from wide receiver.

"You'll see a multitude of formations and sets from us this season," Suriano says. "Most of the successful teams have a 55 percent run to 45 percent pass ratio and we'll be close to that."

Suriano coached Palmer while in high school and said he was pleased with the skills that Palmer showed in spring practice.

"Vince has played four years in my system but has not played the past two years, after transferring to the Mount," adds Suriano. "He is a very good thrower, who makes good decisions and doesn't put the team in a bad position."

Lovell is expected to lead the team's rushing attack once again, and the Lions' coaching staff feel they have solid depth behind the Mount's standout running back. Among others expected to see time in the offensive backfield, at either tailback or fullback, will be sophomore Brett Boehm, junior Ben Widolff, sophomore Kevin Lewis, and senior Terrell Howell. Some freshmen and other first-year players may also see time at the position.

Jones, senior Jonathan Burrell, junior Tim Meiner, and sophomore Mike Russell will lead the wide receivers core, along with a group of others who saw action on the JV team in 2007. First-year receivers will also look to make an impact at this position this season.

Pryor is likely to hold down the starting spot at tight end but senior Bobby Poweski, who is the team's long snapper, is expected to see plenty of action as well.

"I was pleased with how our receivers and backs looked in spring ball," Suriano states. "We'll try to utilize a lot of different personnel during the season on offense."

The Mount also has a good mix of returning starters and newcomers who should be a plus on the offensive front this fall. Seniors Steve Wergers and Brian White, among others, will help lead the way.

DEFENSE: The Mount also has a good mix of returning starters to lead the defense and a new group of starters and back-ups who will move up the ladder into more action this season. Eight of the top 10 tacklers from last season's team, as well as eight different players who won All-HCAC honors from last season will lead the Lions' 2007 defense. Huber will lead the way and looks forward to his team's defensive force this fall.

"We're going to have a pressure defense, stop the run, not give up the big pass play or long run, and play well overall," Huber says.

Leading the way upfront for the Mount on defense will be defensive linemen senior Marshall Root, senior Travis Blank, senior Anthony Bradford (who played offensive line last season), junior Matt Rosenberger, and sophomore Alex Harbin. Linebackers Nick Yahl, a junior, senior Kyle Prosser, and junior Rocky Siegel, will provide experience and talent in the linebacking corps while senior Phil Poetter, senior Joel Steinmetz and junior Ricky Stautberg look to lead the defensive backfield. Huber will also have a strong group of upperclassmen, as well as, newcomers who will push for playing time on the defensive side this fall.

"We'll play four players up front, at times, with eight in the box, three in the secondary and so on," Huber adds. "I like how our personnel looks coming into the season. We'll play some zone, cover three, and play sound defense."

SPECIAL TEAMS: Senior Kevin Koch, will handle kickoffs, field goals and extra points again this fall, while sophomore punter Neil Skirvin looks to hold down the starting punter position once again. Huber is hoping for improvement with the team's kick and punt return personnel.

"We want our returners to take care of the ball, but we're looking at some players who are legitimate return people who will improve our field position," Huber adds. "We'll have some different players compete for those spots. We'll also hope to have strong coverage teams and our freshmen will get a chance to make an impact at both."

HEARTLAND COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE: The conference race figures to be tight this season, with the Mount, Franklin and others fighting for the top spot. The Mount was chosen first in the HCAC pre-season coaches' poll with Franklin finishing second.

"The players in our program need to understand that everybody gets up to beat us," Huber states. "We can't sneak up on anyone now that we're at the top of the HCAC. We need to be prepared week in and week out to bring our "A" game. Last year we had two teams from our conference that had a shot at the national playoffs after week 10. Our conference is getting stronger each year, and has made a huge jump on the national scene. That is a credit to the conference schools."

GENERAL SEASON COMMENTS AND PREVIEW: Huber said that he wants his team to continue to do the same things that it has done in the past – work hard, understand their role and stay focused on winning the conference. This year's senior class has won an unprecedented three straight conference titles, along with three consecutive trips to the NCAA Division III playoffs, and Huber, his staff and team look to build on that.

"I like the make-up of our team this season," Huber says. "We want to be a team first, and need our players to know where they fit in. Our players know what is expected of them to play football at the College of Mount St. Joseph. We finished 23rd in the nation last season in the final AFCA poll, but no one is satisfied with that. We want bigger and better things for this team in 2007."

2007 COACHING STAFF



Head Coach Rod Huber

Rod Huber begins his eighth season as the Lions' head coach for the College's 18th football season. The Lions head coach will also direct the team's defense in 2007. Huber led the program to a third straight HCAC championship last fall, as the Lions went 7-0 in conference play. The Mount became the

first team in HCAC history to record three straight conference titles.

The HCAC title enabled the Lions to return to the NCAA Division III playoffs for the third straight season, as they took on Wheaton College in the first round. The Mount had 15 players selected All-Conference (best in the conference), the HCAC Offensive Most Valuable Player and the HCAC Defensive co-Most Valuable Player. The Lions also had one of the top overall and rushing defenses in the nation again last season. In addition, the Mount was ranked among the top teams in 2006 in various national polls. Huber is a two-time HCAC Coach of the Year and has the most wins of any Mount football coach in program history, sporting a 41-32 record.

Under Huber's direction in 2004, the Lions went 10-0 during the season, won the HCAC, and qualified to their first NCAA post-season game, playing against Wheaton College. The Lions, after a 2-18 mark in Huber's first two years, posted five straight seasons of a .500 or better, including going 28-5 the last three years. Over that three-year span, the Mount is 28-2 in the regular season and 18-1 in conference play.

Huber has 25 years of coaching at the high school and college level and has been on the Mount football staff since the program's inception in 1990. Prior to becoming the third head coach in Lions' football history in 2000, Huber was a defensive position coach and spent four years as the Lions' defensive coordinator. He also coached the College's wrestling program for four seasons. During the 1999-2000 season, the team garnered Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference Tournament and NCAA Division III Midwest Regional championships. Huber was named conference and regional Coach of the Year that season.

Assistant Coach Vince Suriano

Vince Suriano joins the Mount for his first season as the full-time assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach. Suriano will also be the College's coordinator of strength and conditioning.

Suriano came to the Mount from Anderson High School, where he served as the varsity head coach since 1987. During that time, Suriano had a record of 147-61 and led his team to three undefeated regular seasons. In addition, Suriano directed Anderson to five, nine-win seasons and a conference championship in 12 of 15 seasons. Since 1992 Anderson has gone to the state playoffs nine times, including four of the past five seasons. Suriano, who also has experience as a head strength coach, head wrestling coach and teacher at the high school level, was named conference Coach of the Year eight times while at Anderson.

Huber has continued to build upon the concept of the "student-athlete" philosophy set by past Lions' Head Coaches John Pont and Ron Corradini, Sr. Huber oversees the entire program with an emphasis on academic success, recruiting and retention of all football players.

Huber also has strong ties to the Cincinnati community and oversees his players' involvement in community service projects. In 2002, the players helped build homes for Habitat for Humanity, which was featured in the NCAA News. In 2003 the Lions were part of a neighborhood clean-up program in Delhi Township. The Mount football team works on various community and campus service projects each school year.

Coach Huber played football and wrestled at Glen Este High School in Cincinnati, Ohio. Upon graduation he entered the United States Army, where he played football and spent time in Germany and the U.S. After leaving the Army, Huber enrolled at the University of Cincinnati where he obtained a bachelor's degree in social studies education in 1988. He began his coaching career at Lloyd Memorial High School (Kentucky) in 1982, moved on to Glen Este for one season (1986) and later coached outside linebackers at C.A.P.E. High School (1987-1988).

Coach Huber received his master's degree in education from the Mount in 1999. Coach Huber is an active member in the Southwest Ohio Football Coaches Association (SWOFCA), the American Football Coaches Association and is a member of the Jason Foundation. He also runs youth football camps and clinics in the Cincinnati area every year. Huber has been the featured speaker at many events in the Cincinnati area and he serves as an advisory board member for the Boys and Girls Clubs of America (Clermont County). The Lions head coach also speaks at regional and national football events. Hobbies he enjoys include playing the guitar, gardening and fishing.

He and his wife, Sandy, have four children: Jillian, Jake (deceased), Jenna, and Jessica. The Huber's reside in Amelia, Ohio.

The Mount's new coach earned his bachelor's degree in 1974 from West Liberty State College and his master's degree in 1981 from the University of Dayton. He first coached high school football at Martins Ferry High School (Ohio) as an assistant (1974-1984) and then was the head coach at Cadiz High School (Ohio) (1984-1987), where he compiled a 21-9 record.

He is a member of the Ohio High School Coaches Association, Southwest Ohio Football Coaches Association, American Football Coaches Association, National Education/Ohio Education Association, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Suriano and his wife Crystal have two sons, Michael and Christopher. Michael and his wife Sharon are parents of the Suriano's two grandchildren, Avery and Addison. The Surianos live in Anderson Township in Cincinnati, Ohio.



Assistant Coach Jeff Hill

Jeff Hill returns for his second season with the Mount's football coaching staff. Hill directed the Lions' wide receivers last season and will help coach the teams defensive secondary this fall. Coach Hill was previously at the Mount as the team's linebacker coach (2000) and as the wide receiver coach (2001-2003). Hill is also an assistant coach with the Lions' men's and women's track & field teams.

Coach Hill came to the Mount from Union Central Life Insurance in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he worked as an account specialist. Hill also was employed as a physical education director at the Clem and Ann Buenger Boys and Girls Club in Newport, Kentucky. In addition, he has worked as a new business coordinator and account associate at Pension Corporation of America in Cincinnati and was a physical education director at the Kenton County Boys and Girls Club (Kentucky).

Hill, who holds a bachelor's degree in communications from Purdue University, played football in college and was a member of the NFL Cincinnati Bengals (1994-96). He is a graduate of Mt. Healthy High School.

Assistant Coach Ron Woyan

Ron Woyan returns for his eighth season on the Lions' staff and will oversee the team's running backs and special teams.

Woyan had a long career in prep coaching, coming to the Mount after spending seven years as an assistant varsity coach at Mariemont High School. Prior to joining the Mount, Woyan was an assistant coach at Glen Este High School for 16 years, head coach at Glen Este for four years, assistant coach at Anderson High School for six years, and assistant head coach at Bethel-Tate for three years. Coach Woyan was a teacher for 35 years in the Greater Cincinnati area and is a member of the Southwest Ohio Football Coaches Association.

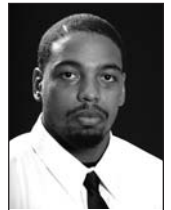

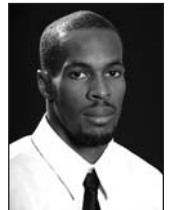

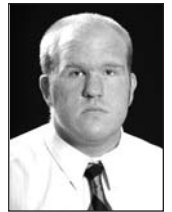

2006 SEASON IN REVIEW

Sept. 2: Mike Lovell rushed for 134 yards and a touchdown and the Mount's defense held Wilmington to 52 total yards as the Lions posted a 24-0 win at home over the Quakers in the season opener for both teams.

Kevin Koch booted a 27-yard field goal to get the scoring started with 10:25 to play in the first quarter. Matt Lawless scooped up a fumble and raced 40 yards for a score with 3:15 left on the clock to give the Mount a 9-0 lead. Koch added the PAT after Lawless' score. Lovell then gave the Mount a 16-0 lead with a 67-yard bolt down the field. Koch added the PAT kick again, en route to the Mount's 17-0 lead at the intermission. Wilmington had only eight yards rushing and five passing yards in the first half while the Lions also held the Quakers to a one-of-eight conversion rate on third down plays. Rashon Lewis tossed a 43-yard score to Jonathan Burrell to end the scoring with 5:27 to play in the game.

The Mount rolled up 181 yards on the ground while Lewis was seven-for-16 and 123 yards passing. Burrell had a game-high four receptions. Kyle Prosser had a team-high nine tackles while Lawless had seven tackles for the Mount. The Lions also intercepted two passes.

Sept. 9: Mike Lovell ran for 162 yards and two touchdowns, and the Lions defense shut down its opponent for the second straight week, as the Mount won at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, 20-9. The Lions went to 2-0 on the season, and 1-0 in the HCAC while Rose-Hulman dropped to 1-1, 0-1.

The story line for this game was nearly the same as the previous contest, when the Mount rolled off a 24-0 season-opening home win against Wilmington College. A strong rushing attack, aided by Lovell's 162 yards rushing on 26 carries, and a strong rush defense, which held Rose-Hulman to 28 yards rushing on 31 carries, enabled the Lions to post their eighth straight regular season win.

After holding Rose-Hulman in their first series, the Lions scored on the third play of their first possession when Lovell raced to the end zone from 62 yards away. Behind the running and throwing of quarterback Rashon Lewis and rushing of Lovell, the Mount built the lead to 12-0 when Lewis scored on a 14-yard keeper. Kevin Koch added the PAT conversion to give the Lions a 13-0 lead with

11:19 to play in the first half. Despite a missed field goal the Lions punched in another touchdown before the half. Mount linebacker Todd Hogel recovered a fumble deep in Rose-Hulman territory and Lovell scored from two yards away with a minute left. Koch's PAT kick made the score 20-0.

The Mount's defense, led by Hogel's five tackles and teammate Kyle Prosser, who also had five tackles, allowed only one first down and one net yard of offense (16 yards passing, -15 rushing) in the first half.

Rose-Hulman got on the scoreboard with 2:45 left in the third quarter on a 25-yard TD pass from Cameron Hummel to Jared Moore and added a safety with just over three minutes to play in the game to complete the scoring.

The Mount rushed for 200 yards in the game and held Rose-Hulman to one-of-13 on third down conversions. The two teams combined for 17 penalties in the game. Prosser tied for a game-high 11 tackles while B. J. Adams and Hogel each recorded eight tackles. Adams added a sack while Alex Harbin also had a sack. Phil Poetter had an interception and blocked a punt.

Sept. 16: The Mount Lions were off to a slow start, leading by a 7-0 score at the half, but poured on 21 unanswered points in the third quarter en route to a 28-7 home victory against Illinois Wesleyan University. The Mount, winners of nine straight regular season games, went to 3-0 on the season while IWU fell to 1-2. The game was the first-ever match-up on the gridiron between the two schools.

Neither team could generate much offense early on as IWU was forced to punt on four-of-six first half possessions, while the Mount punted on three of their first four first half possessions. Two other Mount series ended due to interceptions. Mike Lovell finally put the Mount on the scoreboard with just 48 seconds left in the first half, when he raced in from 11 yards out, capping a five-play, 65-yard drive that took just over one minute to run off. Lovell rushed for 56 yards in the first half. IWU was held to just 73 yards of offense in the opening half.

The third quarter saw the Lions produce TDs on three straight possessions, two by the defense and one by Lovell. Lovell, the Lions senior tailback, scored with 8:14 on the clock in the third quarter, when he plowed into the end zone from three yards away. Kevin Koch added the PAT kick giving the Mount a 14-0 lead. On the Foresters next possession, Mount defensive back Phil Poetter intercepted a pass from Illinois Wesleyan quarterback Brandon Cotter and raced 12 yards for a score. The Lions' defense held again on IWU's next possession and on fourth-and-10 from the 20-yard-line, Matt Lawless blocked a punt and teammate Joel Steinmetz recovered in the end zone for a touchdown with six minutes left in the quarter. Koch added his fourth PAT kick of the game, giving the Mount a 28-0 lead.

IWU scored on a 74-yard TD gallop by Jaryee Maples with 4:01 left in the third quarter. Foresters' kicker Mike Berry converted the PAT kick to end the scoring for the game.

Lovell had 97 yards rushing on 25 carries as the Mount totaled 138 yards rushing. Rashon Lewis was 10-of-18 passing for 114 yards. Lovell, who also tossed a 38-yard completion to receiver Don Haggard, had a team-high three receptions. The Mount's defense was paced by Todd Hogel who had a game-high 10 tackles. The Lions also had four sacks and two interceptions, one each by Nick Yahl and Poetter.

Sept. 30: Mike Lovell rushed for 127 yards on 20 carries with three touchdowns, and Rashon Lewis connected on two TD passes with wide out Mike Jones as the Mount went to 2-0 in the HCAC with a 36-14 home win over Anderson University. The Lions kept their unbeaten record intact, going to 4-0 on the season while Anderson dropped to 1-3, 0-1.

Lovell scored the game's first two TDs, and the Lions added a second quarter safety, giving the Mount a 15-0 lead. Lewis and Jones hooked up for an eight-yard TD pass play with 2:38 left in the first half, and Kevin Koch converted the PAT kick to give the Mount a commanding 22-0 lead at the half. The Ravens were not able to generate much offense in the first 30 minutes of play. Five of seven first-half possessions ended in a punt, one ended in the safety and the other ended at the conclusion of the first half. Lovell, meanwhile, rushed for 101 first half yards.

The Mount tacked on two more TDs in the third quarter, one by Lovell and one by Jones, upping the score to 36-0. Anderson added two, fourth quarter TDs for the final margin.

Lewis went 12-for-21 for 133 yards, two TDs and no interceptions. Marcus Pryor hauled in a team-high three passes for 51 yards. Rocky Siegel had six tackles for the Mount defense while teammate Nick Yahl chipped in five tackles.

The Mount recorded 18 first downs to Anderson's 12 first downs, out-gained the Ravens on the ground 220-82 yards and led in possession time, 33:41 to 26:19.

October 7: The Lions secured rushing touchdowns from three different players and their defense shut down Hanover's offense, en route to a 24-0 HCAC victory at Hanover College. Winner of 11 straight regular season games, the Mount goes to 5-0 overall and jumped to the top of the conference standings with a 3-0 mark while Hanover slipped to 1-4, 1-1. The win by the Mount avenged a 41-35 overtime loss to the Panthers last season, the only regular season loss that the Lions have suffered since the 2003 season.

The Lions rolled up 172 rushing yards on 53 carries and 292 yards overall - on 67 plays - as they controlled the ball throughout the game with their rushing attack against Hanover. The Mount had nearly a 17-minute edge over the Panthers in possession time. The Mount's defense also continued their stellar play this season, shutting out the Panthers by holding them to 11 yards rushing on 18 carries.

The Mount intercepted three Hanover passes and caused two Panther fumbles.

The Mount led by a 7-0 score at the half, thanks to a nine-yard TD run by quarterback Rashon Lewis. Kevin Koch added the PAT kick after the Lewis touchdown. Tailback Mike Lovell scored his ninth rushing TD of the season in the third quarter, and after Koch's PAT, the Lions led by a 14-0 score. The Mount made two scores in the fourth quarter, gaining three points on a Koch 22-yard field goal and a last score with 10:04 left to play when Kevin Cocanougher scored his first TD of the season on a 16-yard run. Koch added the final point on his third PAT of the day.

Lovell finished with 102 yards rushing on 29 carries while Cocanougher had 57 yards on 10 carries. Lewis was nine-of-14 passing for 120 yards with one interception. He also had 35 yards rushing. Tim Meiner had a team-high three receptions.

In addition to the three interceptions, the Mount's defense also had three sacks and forced eight Hanover possessions to end with a punt. The Panthers made it to the Lions' 45-yard line in the second quarter before punting on fourth down. Kyle Prosser had a team-high nine tackles while Phil Poetter had his team-leading fourth interception.

October 14: Kevin Cocanougher raced in from 12 yards out, on his only carry of the game, with 6:48 left in the game, as the Lions ran their record to 6-0 overall, 4-0 in the HCAC with a 21-14 win at Franklin College. The Mount, ranked 18th in the AFCA Coaches Poll, moves into sole possession of first place in the conference. Defiance is 3-0 in the HCAC while Franklin fell to 2-1 in the conference, tied with Hanover College.

Cocanougher's TD run, his second of the season, culminated a seven-play, 46-yard drive that featured the Lions' ground attack, led by tailback Mike Lovell and quarterback Rashon Lewis. The Mount finished the game with 190 yards rushing, including 126 yards on the ground by Lovell.

Lovell and kicker Kevin Koch helped lead the Lions to a 14-0 lead in the game, as the Lions' senior back scored two first-quarter TDs. Franklin scored two TDs in the second quarter and the two teams entered the locker room at the half tied at 14-all. Koch also added the PAT kick after Cocanougher's go-ahead score, completing the scoring for the day.

The Lions' rush defense was again stellar, holding the Grizzlies to 46 yards rushing on 31 carries, intercepting two Franklin passes, and garnering three sacks. Kyle Prosser led the Lions defense with nine tackles. The Lions entered the game with the eighth-ranked defense in the nation against the run, allowing only 46.8 yards rushing per game. They also were fourth in the nation in total defense, allowing 158 yards per game. They gave up 210 total yards to Franklin.

October 21: The Mount gained 250 yards on the ground and received rushing touchdowns from three different players, as they rolled to a 34-12 Homecoming win against Manchester College. The Lions improved to 7-0 on the season, 5-0 in the HCAC. Manchester slipped to 1-6, 0-4.

Rashon Lewis got the Lions on the scoreboard early in the game when he raced 75 yards to pay dirt. Lewis and tailback Mike Lovell then hooked up on a 60-yard pass play for a TD, and Kevin Koch converted his second PAT kick of the day, to give the Mount a 14-0 lead in the first quarter. The Lions would hold that lead heading into the locker room at the half.

Manchester made a game of it in the third quarter, when they scored two TDs but failed to convert the PAT kick after the first score and were stopped on a two-point conversion pass on the second score. The Mount's power rushing attack helped put the game away in the fourth quarter when Lovell scored on an

eight-yard rush, Lewis found wideout Mike Jones on a 24-yard TD strike and Tim Kelly bulled into the end zone on a two-yard run.

Lovell finished with 133 yards rushing while Kevin Cocanougher added 40 yards on the ground. Lewis had 125 yards passing on seven-of-12 with two TDs and no interceptions. Jones had a team-high four receptions for 57 yards.

Rocky Siegel and Kyle Prosser each had a game-high 11 tackles. The Mount held Manchester to four-of-16 on third-down conversions.

October 28: Mike Lovell rushed for two touchdowns and an opportunistic Lions' defense recovered four fumbles, had five sacks and an interception as the Mount clinched their third straight HCAC title with a 20-6 win today at Defiance College. The Lions, ranked 16th in the AFCA Coaches Poll, jumped to 8-0 on the season and 6-0 in the HCAC. Defiance now holds a 6-2, 4-1 record.

The Mount is the first school in HCAC history to record three straight HCAC football championships.

On a cool, gusty and overcast day in Defiance, Ohio, the Lions had to rely again on their power running attack and their shutdown defense - two staples that have enabled the Mount to post another stellar season. Quarterback Rashon Lewis raced in from seven yards out with 2:53 to play in the first quarter for the first score in the game. Kevin Koch added the PAT kick to give the Lions a 7-0 advantage. That drive was aided by a Mount fumble recovery, while a second Defiance fumble led to the Lions' second score. Lovell plunged in from two yards out after a fumble recovery by the Lions' Matt Lawless, putting the Mount up 13-0 early in the second quarter.

Defiance got on the scoreboard 3 1/2 minutes later when they scored on an 11-yard pass play and the subsequent PAT kick was missed, leading to a Mount 13-6 lead at the half. The Yellow Jackets would suffer three more turnovers in the second half, including an interception by the Mount's Phil Poetter, his team-leading fifth of the season, as they never could get their offense fully untracked. Defiance also fumbled the ball away on the Mount two-yard line in the third quarter.

Lovell finished with 106 yards rushing on 32 carries, as he moved to within 13 yards of his third straight 1,000 yard season. Lewis was zero-for-eight passing, with many attempts into the strong wind, as the Mount generated only 104 yards of total offense. Poetter led the defensive effort with eight tackles, including six solo stops. B.J. Adams and Lawless each collected eight tackles.

Lions' punter Neil Skirvin had a 88-yard punt in the game, the best-ever at the Mount and in the conference.

November 4: Mike Lovell rushed for two touchdowns and 166 yards as the Lions rolled over the Bluffton University Beavers, 17-0. The win moved the Mount to 15th in the AFCA Coaches Poll and improved their record to 9-0 overall and 7-0 in the HCAC. Bluffton fell to 3-6 and 2-4 in the HCAC.

The name of the game was defense, as the Mount shutout the Beavers in what has become a reoccurring theme for the Lions in 2006. Entering Saturday's play the Lions' defense was ranked sixth in the nation in total defense and fourth in the nation in scoring defense, with an average of 7.8. Leading the way for the Mount was senior Matt Lawless, who on Senior Day recorded eight tackles. Five of Lawless' tackles were unassisted. Junior Kyle Prosser also collected eight tackles.

Junior Marshall Root recorded 1.5 sacks forcing the Beavers to lose 12 yards. The Mount dominated the line of scrimmage holding Bluffton to only 146 yards of offense, compared to the 348 picked up by the Lions. As time ticked down on the end of the first half, the Mount led only 3-0. That was until Lovell's eight yard touch-

down run with only 46 seconds remaining in the half, putting them ahead 10-0. The second half was scoreless until another Lovell touchdown in the fourth quarter gave the Lions a tight hold on the game, en route to the win.

With his 166 yards, Lovell recorded his third straight 1,000 yard season, giving him 1,153 yards rushing this season. At the end of the game Lovell was 69 yards away from setting the Mount's all-time career rushing record.

November 11: The Lions bid for an undefeated regular season ended today as they dropped a 21-17 decision against Thomas More College in the 2006 regular season finale. The Saints' Monty Collier rushed in from three yards out for the go-ahead score with nearly 6 1/2 minutes to play as Thomas More held on for the win. The Lions fell to 9-1 on the season while Thomas More completed their campaign with a 6-4 mark.

Thomas More scored first when Chase Weber scored on a 79-yard pass reception from a Kyle James pass. Mike Lovell capped a three-play, 49-yard drive in the second quarter, to cut the deficit to 7-6 as the Lions missed the PAT kick. The Saints blocked a Mount punt early in the second half and recovered the ball in the end zone for a TD, en route to a 14-6 lead at the half.

The second half saw the Mount turn things around and roll off 11 unanswered points, thanks to three field goals by Kevin Koch and a safety on a bad punt snap. The Lions took a 17-14 lead with 13:27 left in the game. Thomas More then ran off an 11-play, 80-yard drive on its next possession, as Collier scored from the three-yard-line on second-and-goal. David Sheely made the PAT kick to put the Saints up 21-17. The Lions could generate only 13 yards of offense on their last possession of the game, as they turned the ball over on a fumble.

Lovell had a game-high 122 yards rushing, bringing his total to 1,275 on the season. That total left him just 32 yards short of the Mount's single-season rushing yardage record (Doug Anderson, 1,306 yards, 2000 season). Lovell broke the career rushing record of 3,658 yards set by Shad Wetterich (1994-1997). Thomas More out-gained the Lions, 248-168 in total offense, despite gaining only 84 yards rushing on 37 carries. Both teams were two-for-11 on third-down conversions while Thomas More had the edge in time of possession, 31:17 to 28:43.

Kyle Prosser led the Mount with 13 tackles while Matt Lawless had 12 tackles and two sacks.

November 18: Wheaton College scored early and often, racing out to a 28-0 lead at the half en route to a 42-28 win over the visiting Lions in the first round of the NCAA Division III Championships. The Lions ended the season with a 9-2 mark, their second straight such finish, while Wheaton (10-1) moved on to the second round with a Nov. 25 game at Mount Union College. Wheaton defeated the Mount in 2004 in the first round of the NCAA Division III playoffs, 31-7.

Mount senior tailback Mike Lovell gained 43 yards on 14 carries and finished the season with a Mount single-season best of 1,318 rushing yards. Doug Anderson had held the season rushing record of 1,306 yards set in 2000.

The Mount held Wheaton College to three plays and out on the first possession of the game, and stymied the high-powered Wheaton offense much of the first quarter. Wheaton came into the game averaging nearly 440 yards of total offense and 39 points per game. The Thunder posted the first score of the game when quarterback Jeremy Chupp raced in from eight yards out with 53 seconds left in the first quarter. Wheaton added three TDs in the

second quarter and converted the PAT kick after each to advance to a 28-0 lead at the half.

Wheaton's defense held the Mount to 98 yards of offense in the first half, and a zero-for-eight conversion percentage on third down. The Lions also missed a 36-yard field goal attempt early in the second quarter.

The second half started similar to the first half with neither team generating much offense. Wheaton got on the scoreboard again with 4:25 to play in the quarter, thanks to a 79-yard punt return for a TD, giving them a 35-0 advantage. Following that kickoff, the Mount scored their first points of the game as senior quarterback Evan Dreyer came off the bench to engineer a seven-play, 71-yard drive which was culminated on his 22-yard TD pass to senior wide out Don Haggard.

Chupp added another score, this time on a 14-yard keeper, just into the fourth quarter. After the PAT kick, Wheaton led by a 42-6 score. The Mount made a game of it throughout the fourth quarter,

as they continued to move the ball on offense and held Wheaton in check on defense. Dreyer tossed a 44-yard TD pass to junior tailback Kevin Cocanougher, and then added a two-yard TD run of his own to cut the deficit to 42-20. Senior Tim Kelly plunged into the end zone with 1:48 left in the game and Dreyer hit Cocanougher for the two-point conversion pass to end the scoring in the game.

Dreyer finished with 15 completions in 21 attempts for 240 yards and two TDs while Rashon Lewis chipped in 64 yards passing. Cocanougher led the Mount with six receptions and all players with 113 receiving yards. Joel Steinmetz had a game-high tying 12 tackles and one forced fumble.

The Mount had 23 first downs to Wheaton's 18 first downs, and out-gained the Thunder in total offense, 390-385. The Lions also won the time of possession battle, 34:20 to 25:40. The Lions forced five fumbles and recovered three while Wheaton forced two fumbles and recovered one. The Mount's Kyle Prosser had the lone interception in the game.

MOUNT IN THE HCAC

The College of Mount St. Joseph has been a member of the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference (HCAC) since 1998. The HCAC was created as the Indiana Collegiate Athletic Conference (ICAC) in June of 1987 when the presidents of six private Indiana colleges and universities (Anderson, DePauw, Franklin, Hanover, Manchester, and Wabash) formed an association based on the academic excellence of each school. Taylor and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology joined the conference in 1988.

The 1998-99 school year brought significant changes in the conference. With the additions of Bluffton College, College of Mount St. Joseph and Wilmington College, and the departure of DePauw University and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, the Indiana Collegiate Athletic Conference changed its name to become the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference. Wabash's competition in the 1999 football season marked its last season in the conference and Defiance College joined the HCAC in the spring of 2000. In January of 2001, Transylvania University in Lexington, Kentucky, was accepted as a member. Transylvania began competition in the fall 2001 season. (Transylvania competes in all conference sports except football.)

In 1998, the first year in the conference, the Lions finished with a 2-5 record. Doug Anderson, Doug Nicholas and Mark Stewart were named First Team All-Conference while Mark Schorsch, Eric Seibert, Mike Lind, and Eddie Stewart all gained Honorable Mention status. Doug Anderson placed fourth in total rushing yards. John Flowers placed third in punt returns and fourth in kickoff returns.

The Lions ended the 1999 season with the same record, 2-5, as in 1998. The Mount rushed for 1,543 yards in 1999, which placed them first in rushing among the other six teams. Doug Anderson helped the Lions gain that title by rushing for 676 of those 1,543 yards, placing him second in rushing yards among all other players in the conference. Mark Schorsch scored seven touchdowns for the Mount and scored a total of 44 points. During this year, Doug

Nicholas, Eddie Stewart and Brian Roemer were given the award of First Team All-Conference and Doug Anderson, Clint Kirker, Justin Roden, and Mark Schorsch were chosen Honorable Mention.

2000 brought about a 0-6 record, but the Lions had many accomplishments. The Lions were third in rushing with 827 yards, including 687 yards gained by Doug Anderson in conference games. Matt Goodwin and Anderson were named First Team All-Conference; Chad Corbin, Jeff Haynes, Bob Lehman, and Matt Sunderman were named Second Team All-Conference; and Corey Jones, Bart Stouffer and Jerry Thompson received Honorable Mention awards. Player of the Week awards were given to two Mount players: Anderson for offense and Jeff Haynes for defense during the week of September 16.

The Lions were winless in the conference for a second year in a row in 2001, posting a 0-6 record. The Lions, however, did record some solid numbers in the HCAC. The Mount defense placed third in rushing with 1,417 total yards, averaging 3.3 yards per rush.

The Lions also placed third in total sacks with 27 for 176 lost yards. Chris Stoffran and Chad Corbin were named First Team All-Conference. Brooks Klosterman, Mike Holzinger, Pat McAtee, and Neil Nieberding were named Second Team All-Conference, and Joe Dollenmeyer, Paul Behling and Matt Goodwin received Honorable Mention distinction.

The Mount was the surprise team of the conference in 2002. Picked for sixth (out of the seven conference schools) in the coaches preseason poll, the Mount rolled off four straight conference wins to open the season and finished 4-2 in the HCAC - the team's first .500 or better record in their conference history. The Lions came in third in the HCAC, finishing behind Hanover and Anderson (preseason favorite). Ten players made one of the All-Conference teams (first, second or honorable mention) while Andy Wellendorf was selected Freshman of the Year and Pat McAtee was named Defensive Player of the Year. Head Coach Rod Huber was also chosen as HCAC Coach of the Year. Six different players received All-Academic status and six Mount players grabbed HCAC Player of the Week honors.

MOUNT IN THE HCAC (continued)

The Lions had another fine season in 2003. They took their second straight third place finish, ending with a 4-2 record with losses to Hanover and Anderson. The Lions also had ten players awarded All-Conference honors of either first, second or honorable mention. Senior Eric Johnson also won the Defensive Player of the Year award.

The 2004 season was an historic one for the Lions in the HCAC. The team breezed through the regular season unbeaten, 6-0, and recorded their first HCAC Championship, edging Hanover College by one game. The Lions were led throughout the season by many different players, including wide receiver Andy Wellendorf and Matt Lawless, who each grabbed conference Player of the Year honors. Head Coach Rod Huber received his second HCAC Coach of the Year award, as he directed his squad to their first-ever NCAA Division III playoff appearance. Twelve Lions in all, including seven on the first team, were named All-Conference for their play. The Mount also grabbed 10 HCAC Player of the Week awards during the season. The Mount's defense allowed a conference-best 65 yards rushing per game.

In 2005, the Mount picked up right where they left off the year before. In another impressive season, the Lions once again plowed through the regular season, finishing with a record of 9-1 overall and a 5-1 record in the HCAC. It would mark their second consecutive outright HCAC Championship, a feat accomplished only twice before in conference history. A number of Lions had stellar individual years and the Mount saw fourteen players reach All-Conference status. Mike Lovell was named the 2005 HCAC Offensive Most Valuable Player and Kevin Koch won the HCAC Special Teams Most Valuable Player. The Lions received their second straight and second-ever bid to the NCAA Division III Playoffs.

The Mount claimed its third straight HCAC title in 2006, going 7-0 and outscoring conference teams, 172-55. Mike Lovell (offense) and Matt Lawless (co-defense) captured individual MVP awards in the conference while the Lions placed a conference-best 15 players on the first, second and honorable mention All-HCAC teams. The Lions were first in rushing offense, rushing defense and punting, as well as second in total defense, pass defense and turnover margin. Lovell placed first in rushing yards per game, nearly double the runner-up, first in points scored per game. The Lions also had received six HCAC Player of the Week awards and had five student-athletes make academic All-Conference.
