ATHLETIC FACILITIES AT THE MOUNT

The Mount provides its students with athletic fields and the Harrington Center, a modern two-level student union with a running track, gym, fitness center, and food court. During the 2003-2004 academic year, the Mount began its "Building Excitement" Campaign, which included athletic fields to accommodate more Mount teams on campus for practice and home games.

On the east side of the Mount's campus, the Lions have the Sports Complex and Schueler Field, home to the College's football, soccer, lacrosse, and track & field programs. The Sports Complex seats up to 2,400 spectators and additional facilities house the Mount's academic program in athletic training, as well as locker rooms and concessions. The "Building Excitement" Campaign, which included the renovation of nearby College property into practice fields on River Road, has given the Lions' softball team a home field – the Kinder Morgan Softball Complex, and practice fields for the College's baseball, soccer, football and lacrosse teams.

The Mount Lions' baseball team plays home games at Midland Field in Amelia, Ohio, one of Cincinnati's finest baseball facilities for

teams and spectators. They also play home games at the University of Cincinnati's Marge Schott Stadium, one of the top collegiate settings in the Midwest.

The Harrington Center, which opened in 1998, contains two full courts for Lions' volleyball and basketball as well as the full range of Mount intramural teams. The Harrington Center also features a specially-surfaced indoor running track; courts for racquetball, squash and wallyball; fitness center; weight training; athletic training; and locker facilities. The Mount's wrestling team also has home matches and invitationals in the Harrington Center.

The Mount's west campus field, the J. Page Hayden Athletic Field, is the location for the Mount's field events during track & field meets and is a practice field for the Lion's Roar Band. The Mount also provides lighted tennis courts for intercollegiate and intramural teams.

The Mount men's golf team's home course is Miami Whitewater Forest Golf Course in Harrison, Ohio. The course is a par-72, 6,808-yards course with a rating of 72.3 and a slope of 125. The women's golf team's home course is Aston Oaks Course in North Bend, Ohio.

MOUNT ATHLETICS DIRECTOR



Steve Radcliffe

Steve Radcliffe entered his 14th year as the Lions' athletic director for the 2008-2009 school year, and he looks forward to another outstanding season of athletics at the Mount.

The Mount's athletics programs enjoyed many successes this past fall. Football finished the season with a 5-5 overall record, the seventh straight season for the Lions to finish with a .500 or better record. The

Women's Soccer team, which won the HCAC with a perfect 8-0 season in the HCAC, captured the HCAC Tournament Championship to qualify to the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional. The 14 wins they had were a school single-season record. The Volleyball Team, a regular member of the AVCA Coaches Poll Top 25, finished with a 29-11 record, won the HCAC Regular Season title with a 7-1 record and also won the HCAC Tournament. The Lions received an automatic qualification to the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Regional where they knocked off Washington & Lee University.

The Lions' winter athletic teams, men's and women's basketball, and wrestling, were engaged in competitive seasons and looking to move on to the Conference Tournaments and perhaps beyond. Many individuals were enjoying strong seasons.

Radcliffe, who oversees 21 athletic programs at the Mount, has long been a part of the sports programs at the College. A retired athletic trainer, Radcliffe began his athletic training career in 1976 and was hired to implement the Mount's first academic program for athletic training in 1989. In addition, Radcliffe has been the Lions' head athletic trainer, working with athletes from all the intercollegiate sports, as well as teaching athletic training at the College.

Radcliffe, who received his bachelor's degree in 1978 and his master's in physical education in 1981 from Miami University (Ohio), became the Mount's athletic director in 1995. Upon entering the position, Radcliffe stressed the importance of upholding the College's stellar reputation of academics and athletics as a positive influence in student life and development at the Mount. Steve and his wife, Darlene, have two children, Victoria and Michael. The Radcliffes live in Delhi.

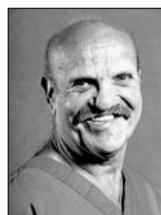

2009 OUTLOOK

The Lions' men's tennis team is looking forward to another season of hard work and improvement, which they hope will add to their win totals. They are looking to build upon the progress and experience they gained last year to advance their team's success for 2009. To keep the team focused this season, Head Coach Del Walters has outlined team goals to keep the team on track towards those achievements.

"Our goals for this season are to compete hard every match, continue to improve upon our overall record as well as our conference record," Walters explains.

The Lions will have to work hard to triumph in what is shaping up to be a very tough conference. Walters knows that overall strength from the conference they will face this spring will challenge them to improve.

"The competition in the conference is always tough," Walters adds. "There were a lot of teams with good young talent last year that gained valuable experience. I expect that will carry over and the HCAC will have some great battles."

Walters is optimistic about how the team will do this season, after gaining valuable experience last season for quite a few first-year players. Combining the team's new talent with returnees' looking to have breakout years, the Lions hope to be a much tougher opponent this season.

"Compared to last season, we had a great off-season and the kids are working hard in their pre-season training," Walters says. "Add to that the infusion of new and exciting talent, and I believe we will be much more competitive in conference play. I am looking for Price Combs to have a breakout year. Last year was about him getting his

feet wet, now with a year of experience he should make a push for All-Conference."

Combs, who led the team last season with 20 matches played, is in his second season as is teammate Ryan Tarvin. Combs tied for the second-most wins on the team last spring. The Mount has three players – Robby Lykes, Kyle McCord and Tim Moody beginning their third seasons of play. Lykes played in 18 matches last season while Moody competed in 19 matches. Combs, Moody, Tarvin, and Lykes all finished tied for the second-most wins on the team in 2008.

This year's team is one of the Mount's biggest in quite some time, with 12 players on the roster. There are seven new players on the roster, some of whom that has played for Walters on the hard court for the Lions. Lykes, McCord and Tarvin are also Lions' basketball team members.

The entire team has been working very hard this off-season to be prepared both mentally and physically for each and every match this season. Walters has been focusing his off-season training on development and stamina building. Players from the basketball team figure to be in the best of shape of many of the tennis players on the Mount or opposing schools.

"So far we've done more challenging drills that really concentrate on mental toughness, fighting through fatigue and overall skill development," Walters says. "I think if we keep going as hard as we have we should be fine."

With their training and preparation, the Lions' team hopes to continue to improve. With a positive attitude the Lions are aiming for a successful season on the tennis courts in 2009.

Del Walters returns for his third season as a Mount men's head tennis coach. Walters is also the Lions' associate men's head basketball coach.

He came to the Mount from Thomas More College where he was a men's basketball assistant coach since 2000. He was also Thomas More's head men's tennis coach (2004-2005), guiding the team to a 7-5 record, and was the men's and women's head cross country coach (2005-2006). Walters also assisted the men's basketball team at John Carroll University as a graduate assistant coach (1999-2000) after playing for two seasons and being a student assistant coach for two seasons. He also has worked at Thomas More College, John Carroll University and Wittenberg University basketball camps.

The Lions' third year coach is a 1994 graduate of Villa Angela-St. Joseph High School in Cleveland, Ohio, where his team won the Ohio Division II State Championship basketball title during his senior season. Walters was a second team all-district and honorable mention all-city basketball selection while in high school. He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the Black Coaches Association.

Walters is a 1999 graduate of John Carroll University, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Communications degree. He resides in Ft. Mitchell, Kentucky.

THE MOUNT IN THE HCAC

The Mount's tennis team is entering its 11th season in the HCAC. Institutions that the Mount competes against include: Anderson University, Bluffton University, Defiance College, Franklin College, Hanover College, Manchester College, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and Transylvania University.

The Lions came in last place in 1999 with zero points, but greatly improved in 2000 and grabbed fifth place out of eight schools in the HCAC Tournament. They accumulated 28 points while the winner, Hanover, had 88.

In 2000 the Mount placed fourth out of seven teams. The Mount hosted the conference tournament in 2001 and finished in sixth place with 21 points. The Lions gained points from Eric Goshorn, Clint Adkins, Craig Hoerst, Ryan Coslett, Jake Poteet, Alex Wehrum, and Jeff Hershner. Eric Goshorn was also named to the All-Conference team.

The 2002 season saw the Lions defeat Defiance College on the road, 6-3. The Mount captured 11 points in the tournament with a sixth-place singles finish by Jeff Hershner as well as seventh-place finishes from Ryan Coslett, Alex Wehrum and Marc Cruz. Cruz and teammate Jason Gilbert came together to finish in fifth place in the third doubles position while the Coslett/Wehrum team posted a seventh place finish in first doubles.

The Mount had a tough conference season in 2003, going 0-6 in HCAC play. Included in those matches was a 7-2 loss to Defiance

College, where the Lions won at third singles and first doubles; and a 6-3 setback to Transylvania, where the Mount won three of six singles matches versus the Pioneers. The Lions did not face HCAC-foe Franklin College in 2003.

The Lions had another tough season in 2004, going 0-6 in the HCAC. They did not face-off with Franklin College last year but did compete against Hanover twice. Even though the Mount did not claim any HCAC wins in the regular season they did score points against Hanover College in each match-up. In the first match-up with Hanover, Joe Hartkemeyer won at second singles; in the second match-up Hartkemeyer won at first singles and Andrew Hall won at sixth singles.

The 2005 season saw the Mount go 1-10 overall and 0-6 in the HCAC. They did not win any sets in HCAC play during play last spring.

In 2006 the Lions finished with an overall record of 4-13. The Mount struggled early in the season, losing 12 of their first 14 matches and finished eighth in the HCAC tournament.

The Lions posted a 3-9 overall record in 2007 while going winless in the conference with an 0-6 record. They did not qualify for the HCAC Tournament.

The Mount had an 0-8 record in the conference last spring, en route to an overall mark of 4-10. They did not qualify to the HCAC Tournament, won by Transylvania.
