The foundation of a Mount education comes from career-minded academic programs combined with dedicated support services and a 10:1 student-to-faculty ratio. New programs include a major in interactive media design & computing as well as minors in coaching and Spanish. The Academic Exploration Program, the Learning Center and personal advising are a few examples of the support that is available to help you achieve your academic goals.

At the Mount, you're encouraged to take your lessons outside of the classroom, into the community. Through the Service Learning Program, students earn academic credit while volunteering to feed the hungry, building homes for Habitat for Humanity, or comforting the elderly. The Cultural Immersion program offers the chance to live, learn and work amidst other cultures. The Cooperative Education program, available for all majors, is a way for students to gain valuable, paid career experience while validating their choice of a major.

Student-athletes are among the Mount's most active leaders on campus. Competing in the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference, the Mount fields more than 20 NCAA Division III sports teams. The newest lineup, men's volleyball, begins in spring 2010. Students also participate in 30 student-run clubs and organizations including Student Government Association, Black Student Union and MSJ Lions Band.

The Mount is committed to working with students to explore all financial aid options, especially eligibility for financial assistance including scholarships. In 2008-2009, 99 percent of full-time freshmen received some sort of gift aid; more than 10 million dollars in grants and scholarships were received by Mount students.

Steve Radcliffe

Steve Radcliffe enters his 15th year as the Lions' athletics director for the 2009-2010 school year, and he looks forward to another outstanding season of athletics at the Mount.

Radcliffe, who oversees 22 athletic programs at the Mount, has long been a part of the sports programs at the College. Radcliffe began his career at the Mount in 1976 as an athletic trainer and was hired to implement the Mount's first academic program for athletic training in 1989. In addition to teaching athletic training, he was the Lions' head athletic trainer for all the intercollegiate sports at the College.

Radcliffe became the Mount's athletic director in 1995. Upon entering the position, he stressed the importance of upholding the College's stellar reputation of academics and athletics as a positive influence in student life and development at the Mount. Radcliffe received his bachelor's degree in 1978 the University of Montana and his master's degree in physical education in 1981 from Miami University (Ohio).

Steve and his wife, Darlene, have two children, Victoria and Michael. The Radcliffes live in Delhi.

Facilities

Sports Complex and Schueler Field

The Sports Complex provides a state-of-the-art space for student-athletes and the fans who support them. It houses concessions, locker rooms, showers, equipment storage, and athletic training facilities and can seat sell-out crowds of 2,400. Sporting a synthetic, all-weather playing surface and track, the Mount's Schueler Field plays host to the football, soccer and lacrosse teams, in addition to home track meets.

Harrington Center

Featuring a 2,000-seat gymnasium, the Jean Patrice Harrington, SC, Student Center is home to the Lions basketball and volleyball teams, and plays host to the wrestling team's home matches. In addition, the facility includes a running track, racquetball courts, a fitness center, and an athletic training center, providing service to student-athletes and the greater Mount community.

Kinder Morgan Softball Complex

The Kinder Morgan Softball Complex has played host to the Mount's softball team since 2007. In addition, the College has developed property on River Road into practice fields for soccer and baseball. The facilities feature parking, restrooms and a service building for equipment storage.

Midland Field and Marge Schott Stadium

The Lions' baseball team plays home games at Midland Field in Amelia, Ohio, and at the University of Cincinnati's Marge Schott Stadium. Midland Field is one of Cincinnati's finest baseball facilities for teams and spectators. The stadium features an indoor batting cage and a professionally maintained playing field.

Marge Schott Stadium, which opened in May 2004, has a seating capacity of 3,085, a field turf playing surface and a fully-lit playing field. In addition, the complex houses indoor batting cages and pitcher's mound, a fully equipped press box with private viewing areas, a players' clubhouse and lounge, dressing rooms for coaches, full laundry and equipment facilities, and a state-of-the-art training room.

Aston Oaks Golf Course

Aston Oaks Golf Course, located 15 minutes from campus, is the Mount's home golf course for the men's and women's golf teams. Constructed by the Jack Nicklaus Design Group, Aston Oaks is a par-72 course. The men's team faces 6,908 yards with a 73.6 rating and 140 slope. The women's team faces 5,758 yards with a 73.2 rating and a 130 slope.

Mount Tennis Courts

The Lions' men's and women's tennis teams play all home matches on the six, fully-lit asphalt courts located behind the Harrington Center.

Hayden Field

Located on the west side of campus, next to the tennis courts, Hayden Field is a multi-purpose site that includes a practice field for softball and track & field athletes.

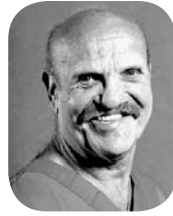

Cincinnati Spotlights

Students of the College of Mount St. Joseph greatly benefit from the rich heritage and traditions of Cincinnati. While the College is situated 15 minutes west of downtown, employment, arts and entertainment are never too far away.

Numerous Fortune 500 and Fortune 1000 companies are headquartered in Cincinnati. Procter & Gamble, The Kroger Company, and Fifth Third Bank, among others, contribute to Cincinnati's foundation while Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center is among the nation's top children's hospitals. Mount Cooperative Education students are hired by more than 100 hospitals, businesses and nonprofit organizations of Greater Cincinnati.

Boasting a vibrant commitment to the arts, Cincinnatians enjoy the Contemporary Arts Center, Cincinnati Art Museum, Aronoff Center, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Music Hall, and a varied supply of art galleries. Mount students often incorporate Cincinnati's art exhibits and performances into their studies.

Cincinnati knows sports. The Cincinnati Reds, the Major League Baseball team, and the Cincinnati Bengals, of the National Football League, provide competition, entertainment and emotion for the city's sports fans. Co-op and volunteer opportunities with these organizations are often available to Mount students. Cincinnati is also home to the Flying Pig Marathon every May and the Master's and Women's Open tennis tournament every August.

Historical neighborhoods such as Mount Adams, Clifton and Over-the-Rhine make good architectural and cultural adventures, while additional entertainment options are just across the Ohio River in Newport, Covington and Mainstrasse of Northern Kentucky.

2009 Season Outlook

Some people might say that trying to better a 14-5-2 season that saw the Lions winning the HCAC Tournament, and securing a place in the NCAA Division III Tournament is foolish, first-year Head Coach Leah Todd is not one of those people. Coach Todd is looking forward to improving in all aspects of the game, making the Lions an even stronger force to be reckoned with.

“Overall the staff is very excited for the upcoming season,” Todd says. “It will be a challenge and, as with years past, our non-conference schedule will prepare us to defend our HCAC championship. The players have worked hard and are ready to get back to business and play Mount soccer.”

Top returnees for the Lions this fall will be seniors Shannon Nortman and Laurie Neumann, along with juniors Ashley Maynard and Jessica Smith. Nortman started all twenty-one games last season recording five assists, tying her for the team lead, and she claimed First Team All-HCAC honors. Neumann also started all twenty-one games and was named First Team All-HCAC as well. Maynard was tied for second for most goals on the team with Nikki Jones and Andrea Caldwell, each with four goals apiece. Smith is a feisty player, according to Todd, and is known for her hard work. She is expected to make a difference in the offense this season. Coach Todd is looking to these players to be team leaders as well.

“All the players on the squad have the ability to lead the team but I will look to these four to be the vocal leaders not only because they are upperclassmen but they earned the respect of their teammates as well,” Todd adds.

Those players who will play at the forward position this season will be a key part in the Lions strategy, too. Caldwell should be a big asset to the offense if she can remain healthy and keep the momentum she finished with last season. Jenna Shull is an incoming freshman who is looked towards to make an immediate impact with her goal scoring ability.

Erin Kroger is a junior, who according to Coach Todd, “has been working hard and should bring that work ethic to the attack and provide another scoring threat.”

Others who are expected to compete for playing time at forward in 2009 are sophomore Mary Frede and freshman Ann Marie Middendorf.

Due to graduation losses, the Lions will be looking for a group of players to step up for the defense. Leading the way on the back line are Neumann and Nortman; both players are also likely to add to the Lions’ offensive attack. These two defensemen will play a key part in helping the Lions win by minimizing the opponent’s goals per game. Rounding out the defenders will be junior Sarah Schulte, sophomore Mary Kate Wilger and freshmen Jessica Pykosz and Ashley Niehaus.

As for the midfield the Lions will look to Smith, Maynard and Jones to keep the ball moving and help provide scoring opportunities. All of these girls had successful seasons in 2008 and look to make an even bigger impact during the upcoming season.

“They all are comfortable with the ball at their feet, are tough tacklers and can transition from defense to offense quickly,” claims Todd.

Among the other midfielders are sophomores Stephanie Spenny and Amanda Sparks and freshmen Brittany Bowman and Alyssa Seiler.

When it comes to ball handling skills the Mount has several very skilled athletes, comments Todd.

“Carrie Rickett and Jessica Smith both see the field very well and can thread passes to their teammates,” Todd states. “Slick passing and ball handling can prove to be a very important aspect of the overall team game.”

The goalkeeper’s position for the Mount this season will be handled by a sophomore and freshmen. Sophomore Kierstin Smith returns after seeing time in just one game last fall and will compete to start as will freshmen Shelbi Benzinger and Kayla Ziegler.

Coach Todd has singled out several games she thinks are stepping stones towards this season goals and eventual success.

“Wittenberg, the first game and the home opener, will be important to start the year off right and set the tone early,” states Todd.

Coach Todd says that all conference games are important and the team will have tough battles against both Transylvania and Rose-Hulman. These two games are toward the end of the season and will play a big part in the Mount’s success this fall.

“There is a tough stretch where we play three games in five days that will show the character and grit of the team,” Todd says. “Those games are at Case Western University, at home versus Capital University, and at Ohio Northern University.”

Coach Todd hopes to parlay the use of the Lions’ deep roster into a post-season tournament run, said Todd.

“We have a strong core of returning players and everyone has been working hard in the off-season,” Todd says. “With only a 22-player roster we are counting on everyone to come in fit and ready to go.”

Along with the depth, however, comes youth. The Mount has ten new players on this year’s squad and each will be expected to contribute right away. The team has a few starting positions to fill which should make preseason practice very competitive.

“We lost some key players to graduation but the returning players have all said that they want to do better than the year before,” Todd adds. “I believe that this year’s squad has the right attitude and determination needed to improve upon last year’s impressive season.”

Mount in the HCAC

This season marks the Mount's 12th season of action in the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference. While a member of the conference, the Lions have been an HCAC power, competing against Anderson University, Bluffton University, Defiance College, Franklin College, Hanover College, Manchester College, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and Transylvania University. Their overall record during their time spent in the conference is 71-13-7. That mark includes six outright conference titles and one shared HCAC title. The Lions hold a winning record against seven of the eight conference opponents, including undefeated marks against Anderson (15-0), Franklin (13-0), Bluffton (11-0), and Defiance (13-0-2).

In 1998, the Lions' first year in the HCAC, the Mount and Wilmington were co-champions with a record of 5-1-1. There was not a conference tournament that year, but many Mount players were recognized for outstanding achievement. Three players were named First Team All-Conference, one player was named Second Team All-Conference, Mandy Blazer was co-MVP of the conference, and Head Coach Sam Pogoni was named Coach of the Year.

The Lions placed second in the regular season with a 5-1 record in 1999, falling just short to Wilmington, who compiled a 6-0 mark. In the HCAC Tournament, the Mount went 3-0, defeating Wilmington by a 1-0 score, giving the Lions the tournament championship. Many Mount players were acknowledged for their accomplishments in 1999 as three players were named First Team All-Conference and one player received an Honorable Mention award.

In 2000, the Lions swept the conference 6-0 and won the end of the season tournament. They went 2-0 in the tournament defeating Anderson 5-0 for the championship. As in previous years, the Mount had a number of players that received awards. Lisa Sutton was named Player of the Year. Sutton and two other players were named First Team All-Conference and two players were named Second Team All-Conference.

In 2001, the Mount placed second behind an undefeated Transylvania team in regular season play with a 5-1 record, but fought back to win the conference championship to qualify for the NCAA Division III Regional Tournament. The Lions again

received many honors including three All-Conference nominees. In addition, Lisa Sutton was also awarded Academic All-Conference, Verizon Academic All-District, NSCAA All-Ohio, and Conference Player of the Week twice. Jill Miller was also an HCAC Player of the Week honoree and Sam Pogoni was named Coach of the Year.

The Lions won five of seven games in the conference in 2002 (with one tie against defending regular season champion Transylvania). The team's lone setback in regular season play came by a 1-0 score at Hanover College. The Mount avenged that loss by defeating the Panthers 2-0 in the conference championship game. Three Mount players, Erin Fox, Erin Mallory and Lindsay Doll were named All-Conference.

The Lions slipped a bit in conference play during the 2003 season, but still compiled a .500 record with a 3-3-1 mark. That record left them in a fifth place tie with Defiance, as they missed qualifying to the post-season HCAC Tournament for the first time ever. The Mount scored the second most goals in conference-only games. Michele Philips was selected for All-Conference honors.

After a one-year absence from the HCAC Tournament, the Mount returned to the conference post-season competition in 2004, but dropped a 1-0 double overtime game to eventual HCAC Tournament champion Manchester. The Lions' defense posted three shutouts in conference play, and qualified to the HCAC Tournament by blanking Bluffton, 6-0, collecting the third seed in the tournament. A conference-tying best total of five players received All-Conference recognition: Margie Pfister, Jessey Spradlin, Lori Sullivan, Michele Phillips, and Sarah Lamping.

Over the course of the 2005 season, the Mount compiled a record of 13-6-2, including a 5-0-2 HCAC record, and steamed rolled to yet another conference championship. Leading the way for the Lions in 2005 was Jessey Spradlin, who tallied nine goals in conference games and was named the HCAC Most Valuable Player. Other players receiving First Team All-Conference recognition were Sandy Rack, Katie Henlein, Michele Phillips, Kristi Poling, and Amanda Hauck. Hauck had an HCAC-best four shutouts in conference play. Head Coach Carrie Taylor was named as HCAC Coach of the Year.

Mount in the HCAC (CONTINUED)

The Lions recorded another stellar season of play in the HCAC during the 2006 campaign, when they rolled to a 7-1 record, good for second place in the conference. The Mount out-scored their opponents 41-5 in HCAC play. The Lions defeated Rose-Hulman in the first round of the HCAC Tournament, 3-1, but fell in the conference championship game to Transylvania by an identical score.

Jessey Spradlin, who led the conference in points per game, and goals, and was tied for second in assists, was voted HCAC Most Valuable Player for the second straight season. She also won three Conference Player of the Week awards. Mount teammates Katie Henlein, Beth Schuermann and Sarah Thaxton were among the offensive statistical leaders while Becky Thaxton was second in goals against average and shutouts, and tied for sixth in saves, as well as HCAC co-Freshman of the Year. Sandy Rack, Kristi Poling, Spradlin and Henlein were named First Team All-Conference while Laurie Neumann and Schuermann were selected Second Team All-HCAC. As a team, the Lions were first in the conference in points, goals and assists, as well as second in goals against average and tied for second in shutouts.

The Mount finished in third place in the HCAC in 2007, losing to the conference's top two teams, Rose-Hulman and Transylvania both by 1-0 scores. The Lions were ousted in the HCAC Tournament by Transylvania, 3-1, but had a fine all-around season of play from many individuals adding up to a strong team performance. The Mount was second in shutouts, goals against average, and assists, and was third in points scored and tied for third in goals

scored. Freshman Ashley Maynard was first in game winning goals, fourth in goals per game and sixth in points per game. Mount leading scorer Beth Schuermann was also in the top ten in the HCAC in goals per game and points per game. Allie Pirman was second in the conference in assists per game while teammate Samantha Huster was fifth in assists per game. Kelly Bare finished first in the HCAC in shutouts (five), second in goals against average and seventh in saves. Schuermann, Pirman and Laurie Neumann were named First Team All-HCAC while Bare and Laura Mund were named Second Team All-Conference. Bare also picked up an HCAC Player of the Week award.

In 2008 the Lions claimed both their regular season title and the conference tournament championship, going undefeated during the entire conference slate of games, out-scoring their opponents 22-1. The Mount was first in HCAC team statistical categories goals allowed per game and shutouts; and second in points scored, goals scored, and assists. Conference MVP Kelly Bare, was second in goals against average and first in shutouts, as she was selected a two-time Player of the Week winner and First Team All-Conference. Beth Schuermann, also a First Team All-Conference honoree, was tied for third in points per game, second in goals and tied for first in game-winning goals, and collected two Player of the Week awards. She was joined on the First Team by Allie Pirman, Laurie Neumann and Shannon Nortman. Nikki Jones, Laura Mund and Jessica Jester were named Second Team All-HCAC. Ashley Maynard was second in the conference in assists while Head Coach Carrie Taylor collected the HCAC Coach of the Year award.
