What is the College of Mount St. Joseph educational experience? It's learning through action – serving others, graduate-level research, paid co-op positions, and leadership development. It's a Catholic liberal arts education that helps you develop the knowledge to make a difference and the integrity to lead others.

The foundation of a Mount education comes from career-minded academic programs combined with dedicated support service and a 12:1 student-to-faculty ratio. New on campus this year is a minor in Sustainability, Nursing Learning Labs and Biochemistry Lab.

At the Mount, you're encouraged to take your lessons outside of the classroom, into the community. Through the Service Learning program, students earn academic credit while volunteering to feed the hungry, building homes for Habitat for Humanity, or comforting the elderly. The Cultural Immersion program offers the chance to live, learn and work amidst other cultures. The Cooperative Education program, available for all majors, is a way for students to gain valuable, paid career experience while validating their choice of a major.

Student-athletes are among the Mount's most active leaders on campus. Competing in the Heartland Collegiate Athletic conference, the Mount fields more than 20 NCAA Division III sports teams. Students also participate in 40 student-run clubs and organizations including Student Government Association and Black Student Union.

The Mount is committed to working with students to explore all financial aid options, especially eligibility for financial assistance including scholarships. In 2010-2011, 96% of full-time freshmen received some sort of gift aid; more than 18 million dollars in grants and scholarships were received by Mount students.

Steve Radcliffe

Steve Radcliffe enters his 17th year as the Lions' athletics director for the 2011-2012 school year, and he looks forward to another outstanding season of athletics at the Mount.

Radcliffe, who oversees 22 athletic programs at the Mount, has long been a part of the sports programs at the College. Radcliffe began his career at the Mount in 1986 as an athletic trainer and was hired to implement the Mount's first academic program for athletic training in 1989. In addition to teaching athletic training, he was the Lions' head athletic trainer for all the intercollegiate sports at the College.

Radcliffe became the Mount's athletic director in 1995. Upon entering the position, he stressed the importance of upholding the College's stellar reputation of academics and athletics as a positive influence in student life and development at the Mount. Radcliffe received his bachelor's degree in 1978 from the University of Montana and his master's degree in physical education in 1981 from Miami University (Ohio).

Steve and his wife, Darlene, have two children, Victoria and Michael. The Radcliffes live in Delhi.

Facilities

Sports Complex and Schueler Field

The Sports Complex provides a state-of-the-art space for student-athletes and the fans who support them. It houses concessions, locker rooms, showers, equipment storage, and athletic training facilities and can seat sell-out crowds of 2,400. Sporting a synthetic, all-weather playing surface and track, the Mount's Schueler Field plays host to the football, soccer and lacrosse teams, in addition to home track meets.

Harrington Center

Featuring a 2,000-seat gymnasium, the Jean Patrice Harrington, SC, Student Center is home to the Lions basketball and volleyball teams, and plays host to the wrestling team's home matches. In addition, the facility includes a running track, racquetball courts, a fitness center, and an athletic training center, providing service to student-athletes and the greater Mount community.

Kinder Morgan Softball Complex

The Kinder Morgan Softball Complex has played host to the Mount's softball team since 2007. In addition, the College has developed property on River Road into practice fields for soccer and baseball. The facilities feature parking, restrooms and a service building for equipment storage.

Marge Schott Stadium

The Lions' baseball team plays home games at the University of Cincinnati's Marge Schott Stadium. Marge Schott Stadium, has a seating capacity of 3,085, a field turf playing surface and a fully-lit playing field. In addition, the complex houses indoor batting cages and pitcher's mound, a fully equipped press box with private viewing areas, a players' clubhouse and lounge, dressing rooms for coaches, full laundry and equipment facilities, and a state-of-the-art training room.

Aston Oaks Golf Course

Aston Oaks Golf Course, located 15 minutes from campus, is the Mount's home golf course for the men's and women's golf teams. Constructed by the Jack Nicklaus Design Group, Aston Oaks is a par-72 course. The men's team faces 6,908 yards with a 73.6 rating and 140 slope. The women's team faces 5,758 yards with a 73.2 rating and a 130 slope.

Mount Tennis Courts

The Lions' men's and women's tennis teams play all home matches on the six, fully-lit asphalt courts located behind the Harrington Center.

Hayden Field

Located on the west side of campus, next to the tennis courts, Hayden Field is a multi-purpose site that includes a practice field for softball and track & field athletes.

Jean Dowell Building

This facility was at one time home to the Lions' women's volleyball and basketball programs. Today the gym in the building is used for the College's intramural programs, as well as being utilized as an extra practice court for both the men's and women's basketball and volleyball teams. A new court was installed during the summer of 2011. In addition, the gym has baseball/softball batting cages used by the Lions' teams.

Cincinnati Spotlights

Students of the College of Mount St. Joseph greatly benefit from the rich heritage and traditions of Cincinnati. While the College is situated 15 minutes west of downtown, employment, arts and entertainment are never too far away.

Numerous Fortune 500 and Fortune 1000 companies are headquartered in Cincinnati. Procter & Gamble, The Kroger Company, and Fifth Third Bank, among others, contribute to Cincinnati's foundation while Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center is among the nations' top children's hospitals. Mount Cooperative Education students are hired by more than 100 hospitals, businesses and nonprofit organizations of Greater Cincinnati.

Boasting a vibrant commitment to the arts, Cincinnatians enjoy the Contemporary Arts Center, Cincinnati Art Museum, Aronoff Center, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Music Hall, and a varied supply of art galleries. Mount students often incorporate Cincinnati's art exhibits and performances into their studies.

Cincinnati knows sports. The Cincinnati Reds, the Major League Baseball team, and the Cincinnati Bengals, of the National Football League, provide competition, entertainment and emotion for the city's sports fans. Co-op and volunteer opportunities with these organizations are often available to Mount students. Cincinnati is also home to the Flying Pig Marathon every May and the Master's and Women's Open tennis tournament every August.

Historical neighborhoods such as Mount Adams, Clifton and Over-the-Rhine make good architectural and cultural adventures, while additional entertainment options are just across the Ohio River in Newport, Covington and Mainstrasse of Northern Kentucky.

2011-2012 Season Outlook

In her second season as the Lions' women's basketball head coach, Ashley Bland says, "Consistency and defense are the keys to having a successful season in 2011-2012."

Bland adds that she is a defensive-minded coach and wants to have the best defense in the HCAC. Having a great defense requires discipline, responsibility, and most importantly teamwork.

"To reach common goals they will have to work together as a team," says Bland. Building teamwork will require extra effort this season as the Lions lost eight seniors to graduation and return just four players from last year's team.

After finishing the 2010-2011 season 6-18 overall and 6-12 in the HCAC, Coach Bland has high expectations and goals for the 2011-2012 season. Bland wants to see a high level of effort from each and every athlete.

"I want to see them work together and be extremely competitive for 40 minutes every game," she adds. Bland wants the team to get into double-digit victories; a feat that has not been accomplished since the 2004-2005 season. Bland also wants the team to finish in the top four of the HCAC, which would make them eligible for the HCAC Tournament.

Junior Shelbi Benzinger and seniors Katie Jo Collins, Courtney Cole, and Leah Schroeder are the four returners for the Lions this winter. Ashley Johnson, a sophomore, returns to the Mount's team after a one-year absence. Coach Bland expects tenacity from her returners, especially from her three seniors.

"They will be the glue that keeps the team together," says Bland. They are expected to be the leaders of the team and hold the other girls accountable. Joining the returners will be 12 newcomers, including a few transfer players, many of whom that have played collegiately before.

Having such a vast set of new players increases the likelihood of having to overcome weaknesses.

"We are small and do not have a lot of post players," says Bland.

Coach Bland plans to overcome the team's lack of height by changing the style of the team's play to complement the team's physical capabilities. Changing the Lions' style of play will help the team build upon their strengths and be more successful, according to Bland. She mentions that the team this year has a lot of talent and a high level of competitiveness. The team appears to have good quickness and a large group of good athletes that will look to get to the rim and make outside shots. Coach Bland plans to utilize the team's speed to play more full court defense this winter.

When asked about a projected starting lineup, Bland states "Everybody has a clean slate when practice starts. I have a best player plays philosophy. A player has to earn their keep those that help win get minutes. Competing for playing time makes every player important. They can push each other as they vie for playing time."

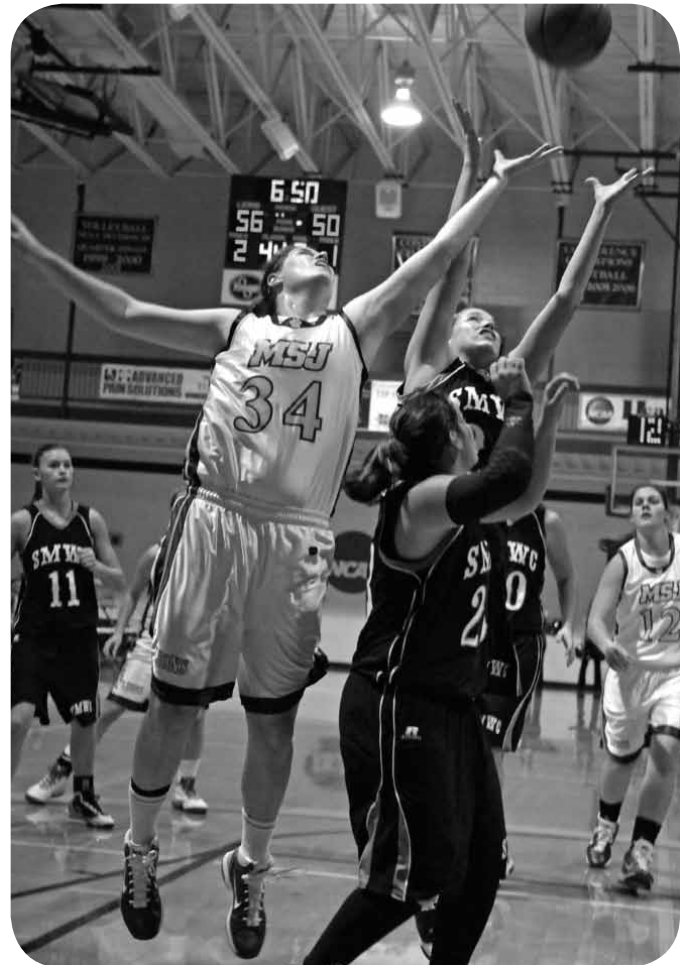

Mount in the HCAC

The Mount has had varying degrees of conference success since joining the Heartland Collegiate Athletic Conference (HCAC) in the 1998-99 season. Other HCAC institutions that the Mount is up against this year include: Anderson University, Bluffton University, Defiance College, Earlham College, Franklin College, Hanover College, Manchester College, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and Transylvania University.

The Lions ended their first year in the HCAC with a 1-11 record. Many of the games ended in close scores, three games having a point margin of four points or less. The end of the season saw the Lions knocked off in the first round of competition against Manchester College. Shauna Bemmes gained two very important achievements in the 1998-99 season. She was named First Team All-Conference and was selected Player of the Week.

The Mount improved during 1999-2000, ending the season with a 5-7 record, which landed them in fifth place overall. The Lions lost in the first round of the tournament to Hanover College. Shauna Bemmes again had two awards given to her that year: Second Team All-Conference and Player of the Week. She was also ranked ninth in scoring with a 13.0 average per game. Kori Strange was third in steals for the conference. She averaged 2.83 per game and Tricia Wiant was sixth in field goal percentage (51.2 percent). In 2000-01 the Lions ended the season 3-9 and tied Anderson for fifth place. They lost in the first round of that year's conference tournament to Franklin College, who lost in the championship game. Virginia Grace had a great year and was honored with the Freshman of the Year and she was named to the All-Freshman Team. Rebecca Petty also achieved two awards, Player of the Week and Second Team All-Conference.

The 2001-02 season saw the Lions record their first-ever HCAC Tournament win with a 67-66 victory over Hanover College. The Mount lost in the semi-final round to eventual HCAC champion Anderson University. AU knocked off Defiance College 62-60 in the title game. The Lions finished the HCAC regular season with a 6-8 mark, tying Hanover for fifth place. Sophomore Virginia Grace had another outstanding season, receiving two

awards: Second Team All-Conference and two-time Player of the Week. Emily Day was named to the All-Freshman Team.

The Lions were the surprise team of the 2002-2003 season in the HCAC. Picked for sixth place in the HCAC Coaches' Preseason Poll, the Mount came in third during the regular season. The team lost two close games - one in overtime - to HCAC leader Transylvania University. The Lions won their first HCAC Tournament Championship by defeating top-seed Franklin College in the Championship game. Head Coach Melissia Patterson claimed her first conference Coach of the Year honors, sharing the award with Transylvania Head Coach Mark Turner. Virginia Grace was the Most Valuable Player of the conference tournament while teammates Rebecca Petty and Christina Brown were also selected All-Tournament.

Grace and Tasha Reid won Player of the Week honors during the season while Grace, Petty and Reid won First-Team All-Conference accolades and Diana Grilloit was named to the conference All-Freshman Team.

The Mount got off to a 2-0 start in the conference in 2003-2004, and saw their overall mark improve to 6-6, but that would be the last time the Lions would hit the .500 overall mark during the campaign. They played win-one-lose-one for most of the remaining HCAC schedule, but did win two in a row, defeating Defiance and Bluffton in early February. They swept the season series against Anderson, Bluffton, and Manchester but lost three games to HCAC-for Hanover College, including their round HCAC Tournament match-up. Virginia Grace was awarded First Team All-Conference honors while Mount teammates Emily Day and Katie Swart were selected Honorable Mention. Those three players, along with Nekeala Richardson (All-Freshman Team) and Adrian Vance were among the conference leaders in many statistical categories for the season.

The Lions finished with a .500 record in the conference during the 2004-2005 season and played competitively. Three of the losses were in overtime and six of the seven setbacks in HCAC play were by nine points or less. They swept the season series against Bluffton and Manchester, captured a

big win at Franklin, who finished first, and advanced to the semifinals of the HCAC tournament by defeating Hanover. The Lions, who had a 4-3 road record in the conference regular season, got All-Conference play from seniors Katie Swart and Emily Day, who were each selected to the All-HCAC First Team. Krystal Clark won Honorable Mention All-Conference accolades, as well as being named Freshman of the Year and to the All-Freshman Team. The Lions capped a solid overall season by placing in the top three of many team statistical categories and in the top ten of some individual statistical groups.

In 2005-2006, the Lions finished in sixth place in the HCAC. The Lions got off to a 4-2 conference record, but saw their season end with a loss to Hanover in the first round of the HCAC Tournament. They finished 5-9 in the HCAC. The Mount was led by sophomore Maria Eichhold, who was named HCAC First Team All-Conference. Other All Conference notables included juniors Christina Marsh and Amanda Hoffman, who were selected Honorable Mention.

The Lions posted wins in 2006-2007 over Hanover and Bluffton and played well in other HCAC games by nine points or less, including a six point loss to HCAC Champion Manchester and an eight point setback to third place Transylvania. Maria Eichhold, Amanda Hoffman and Christina Marsh were named Honorable Mention All-HCAC – the second straight season of winning All-Conference for each player – while Kristen Huss was selected to the conference All-Freshman Team. Eichhold, Marsh, Huss, Shanika Logan, and Ashleigh Stallkamp were among conference’s statistical leaders.

The Mount dropped its first two games in conference play in 2007-08, but bounced back to win their next two HCAC contests, claiming wins over eventual conference champion Anderson and Defiance. The Lions would win three of their first six HCAC games but only record five conference victories on the season. Five of the team’s 11 conference losses were by 10 points or less. As a team, the Mount finished fifth in conference statistics

in field goal percentage, defensive field goal percentage and blocked shots, while All-Conference Honorable Mention selections Kat O’Neill and Ashleigh Stallkamp were in numerous individual categories. In addition, Lauren Schaller finished fourth in rebounds in the conference. O’Neill also won HCAC Player of the Week honor and was named to the HCAC All-Freshman team.

The Lions posted only one win in the conference during the 2008-09 season, claiming a 15-point victory over Defiance College, but played competitively throughout much of the rest of the conference season. The Mount lost six games by nine points or less, including a one-point and two-point losses to HCAC- regular season champion Transylvania University, and a one point loss to Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology. The Mount finished second and third in conference team statistics in free throw shooting percentage and field goal shooting percentage, respectively, and third in rebounding margin. Kat O’Neill, voted HCAC Honorable Mention, was among the conference individual leaders, as was backcourt teammate Abby LaRosa.

The 2009-10 season saw the Lions start out conference play with a 2-1 mark, and suffer two overtime losses in HCAC action. Carolyn Holt was eighth in conference in field goal percentage and 14th in rebounds while Kat O’Neill was sixth in assists and among the top players in scoring average. O’Neill and Holt were each named All-Conference Honorable Mention. The Mount was second as a team in the conference in rebounding margin.

The Lions had their first season under Head Coach Ashley Bland in 2010-2011, and posted six wins in the conference; the best HCAC record the Lions have posted since the 2005-2006 season. Three seniors were named HCAC Honorable Mention: Carolyn Holt, Kat O’Neill, and Abby LaRosa. As a team, the Mount was third in field goal percentage, third in assists per game, sixth in free throw percentage and sixth in points scored per game. LaRosa was fourth in the HCAC in assists per game while Holt was eight in the conference in rebounds per game.
